The Eastern Illustrating & Publishing Company was founded in 1909 in Belfast, Maine by Rudolph Herman Cassens. Cassens' goal was to photograph small towns and rural areas from Maine to California, producing "real photo" postcards that would be valued for promoting tourism. Cassens did not fulfill his dream of photographing the entire country, but his company did produce over 50,000 glass plate negatives of New England and Upstate New York between 1909 and 1947. The collection is full of historic businesses, family homes and local landmarks.

By 1932, the store building in the left foreground housed Ray's Dry Goods Store and later the System Store. The System store was part of the Willey System Co and offered women's clothing, millinery and furnishings. The next building on the left was the first Jonesport fire house, now a museum. The 3<sup>rd</sup> building housed a series of businesses, and the 4<sup>th</sup> building was occupied by the Fred T Stewart Drug Store, followed in about 1930 by the Merrill Trust Company. Main street looking east. Early in the century the Rogers Block, shown on the right, included the R.H. Rogers Grocery Store and Harmon's Pharmacy, which was opened by George Harmon in 1901. Harmon's later moved to present site of Jonesport Pizza and was operated there by the Harmon family until 1976. The Rogers Block burned in 1989. The Michael Church Construction building now occupies the site. The first building on the left was an IGA Store early in the century and later became the site of a beauty parlor operated by Helen Feeney and a barber shop owned by Hickey Lamson. The 2<sup>nd</sup> building on the left was an ice cream parlor, replaced in 1933 by the Russell Rogers General Store. Destroyed by the 1989 fire, this is the present site of Hamilton Marine. Main Street looking east. The Marie McCollum house, in the foreground, still exists. The 2<sup>nd</sup> building once housed a barbershop owned by Les Whiting. To its left was the Farm Bureau building, subsequently owned by another barber, Harold Wheeler, who lived in the building. Next was Sherm Woodward's Store, a small variety store that sold penny candy, ice cream, tobacco, and kerosene for heat among many other goods. Charles and Velma Kilton owned this store after Sherm Woodward. The Peabody Library is located across Main Street from this site. LB2007.1.107270 JA 130

This photo, taken about 1910 shows the D.J. and E.M. Sawyer Store built in 1895 on the NW corner of Sawyer Square. The store handled general merchandise and outfitted ships. During its history, in addition to the store, the building also housed the U.S. Customs House (see the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, right), the Pittsfield Trust Company Bank, and the Worcester-Sawyer Insurance Agency. The top two floors have been owned since 1936 by Jonesport Masonic Lodge #188, and the first floor is currently the home of the Jonesport Historical Society. LB2007.1.111541 JA 47, 54, 65.

This is a view of the Jonesport House, owned and operated by Cecelia (Foss) Woodward, known as Aunt Cecilia, from 1923 to 1949. The Jonesport House offered meals and rooms to travelers. The Jonesport Post Office, built in 1962, now stands on this site. The chestnut tree just to the right of the building still stands. LB2007.1.101124





The William Underwood Company was the first sardine cannery to operate in Jonesport. This building was constructed in 1898. Underwood consistently upgraded its facilities, using the most up-to-date machinery available. At one point, the plant in Jonesport was regarded as the "World's Largest Sardine Factory". The left portion of the building was used for employee housing and became known as the "Tenement House". When the facility closed in 1962, the U.S. government purchased the property, and it has been the site of a U.S. Coast Guard base from that time to the present. The Mansfield Sardine Factory (center of the photo) was owned and operated by George Frederick Mansfield, and was located at the south end of present-day Bluenose Street. This factory burned in a large fire started in a blueberry fire on the outskirts of town in 1930. The building at the far left was the C.H. Mansfield Fish Packing plant operated by Charles Henry Mansfield, brother to George Frederick Mansfield. This plant was dismantled in the 1930s and moved to Portland. The District 3 School House on the left was used by the Cahoosic Tribe No. 72 of the Improved Order of Red Men, and the building was known as Red Man Hall. The Hall was located on Cranberry Lane behind the current T.A. King & Son Building Supplies. The church in the foreground was originally built as a Baptist Church, and later housed the Union Church, the Congregational Church, and the original Latter Day Saints Church. Moose Peak Light Station, located on Mistake Island, was also known as Mistake Island Light, Head Harbor Light and Moose-a-bec Light. Rocky 27-acre Mistake Island is about five miles southeast of Jonesport. The photo shows the "Keeper's House" with part of the boardwalk and covered boardwalk between the house and the light tower. About half the length of the walk was covered. The house and the boardwalk were built in 1903, replacing an earlier house. The "Keeper's House" was blown up in 1982 by a government military team. All that is left of Moose Peak Light Station is the brick and masonry light tower on four acres of land. The rest of Mistake Island belongs to the Nature Conservancy. Caption contributed by Donald C. Loon Point Beach, located near the intersection of Kelley Point Road and the Fire Road. A favorite camping spot of Native Americans, Loon Point was later settled by Thomas Cromwell, who leased his land from Thomas Kelley. Colonel Oliver Peabody (Kidder and Peabody) arrived from Boston in the late 1870s and built a summer cottage on 25 acres there in 1880. The cottage burned in 1903.
